Food vendors at events

Are you coordinating a public event or planning to be a food vendor at an event? All foods served to the public require notification to Clark County Public Health and usually require a food permit.

The Frequently Asked Questions page on our website has permitting information for food vendors and event coordinators. If you are thinking of being a food vendor at an event, be sure to apply for temporary event permits at least two weeks in advance to avoid a late fee.

Some foods may be exempt from permit or may be covered with a permit from the Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA). For these foods covered by a WSDA permit, we offer a free Certificate of Review that notifies our food inspectors that you have already spoken to our plan review team and have had your WSDA verified. If you have a WSDA permit, apply for a Certificate of Review here.

Community outreach – plan review presentation

Food allergy reminder

Can the Person in Charge (PIC) at your food establishment describe foods that have the nine major allergens and the symptoms of an allergic reaction? Are all foods packaged in house properly labeled with foods containing the nine major allergens as ingredients?

If not or you're unsure, find printable signs and information on allergen awareness for food workers from the Washington State Department of Health. Additional information can be found on US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) website for food allergies.

Use these resources to stay in compliance for allergen awareness at your food establishment.

FDA alert - Elevated lead levels in ground cinnamon

The FDA has issued an alert for elevated levels of lead found in six brands of cinnamon regularly found at discount grocery stores. The FDA has recommended the distributors and retailers issue a voluntarily recall and has advised consumers to throw away and not to buy the ground cinnamons listed in the alert.

People can report complaints, cases of exposure, and adverse events to the FDA's MedWatch Safety Information and Adverse Event Reporting Program by completing an electronic Voluntary MedWatch form online. For other ways to report, visit the Industry and Consumer Assistance webpage.
