	QUESTION	ANSWER
1.	<p>Do you anticipate ordering a full years' worth of envelopes at one time like you have done in the past or ordering on an election by election basis? – or maybe 2 elections at a time?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> And, can I assume that you would be ordering the in-house #11's at the same time as the large use #11's? 	<p>We would be ordering envelopes a full year at a time.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Yes, we would put in our yearly order for these at the same time.
2.	<p>Would you be able to provide the prices for these envelopes in the last year of the existing contract?</p>	<p>Envelope #1 - \$22.80/1000 Envelope #2 - \$17.95/1000 Envelope #3 – This envelope was not part of the current contract Envelope #4 - \$78.20/1000 Envelope #5 - \$105.60/1000</p>
3.	<p>Once these get printed, they would be put into storage and released when you guys were ready for them. Do you know what quantity will be released each time for each envelope?</p>	<p>It will vary depending on the size of the election. Jurisdictions can choose which election they want to have a measure on the ballot. General Elections in November are always full county elections. Could only be a few thousand or it could be up to 340,000.</p>
4.	<p>For the price for imprinting the election date in black on the #11's, will you be needing us to add that prior to each election on approximately 300,000 at a time?</p>	<p>Yes, we will need it for every election. The size of the election will vary, it could only be a few thousand or it could be up to 325,000.</p>
5.	<p>The front page of the document lists RFP #786, but the header of the RFP says RFP #785. Which is the correct number?</p>	<p>RFP #786, is the correct number.</p>
