Approval of July 8, 2021, Meeting Minutes Motion made to approve by Les Schreiber, motion seconded by Steve Slegers, minutes approved as written.

Community Roots Presentation

Chris Thobaben with Community Roots Collaborative (CRC) gave a presentation on their tiny home development in Fruit Valley. CRC's community consists of 21 tiny homes and one house with four units. There are six units reserved for Veterans. A second phase project (50 units) will be located on property near Saint Johns, funded with city and state funds. The ribbon cutting for the tiny homes project will be held at 10:00 am on August 23. A second program that Chris spearheads is Marine for Life Program where he connects community partners with marines in need of services. Since October, 17 Veterans have obtained employment through the program. Email for this program is <u>m4lpdf@gmail.com</u>.

Cowlitz Tribe Veterans Services

Teri Graves is the Cowlitz Tribal Veterans Representative, located in DuPont, Washington, where the Tribe just purchased the Girl Scout Headquarters Building. Teri is the main contact for the Warriors Program and Veteran-related tribal information; she is also training as a VSO. Currently, the program serves approximately 178 Veteran tribal members located up/down the I-5 Corridor. Teri is looking to identify more tribal Veterans in Washington.

2021 Portland Stand Down - September 10th

Leslie Luo updated the board on the Portland Stand Down. It will be 9:00 am to 2:00 pm on September 10th at the Veterans Memorial Coliseum. Services provided range from housing to healthcare, with 15 employers onsite looking to hire Veterans. Leslie shared a registration link for service providers to join the Stand Down.

Committee Reports Policies and Procedures: As a follow-up to last months' question regarding County Veteran services, RCW 73.08.010 is to be referenced.

June 2021 Contractor Reports & Fund Report

The fund assisted 24 Veteran households with \$25,041 in assistance; there was one denial. Year-to-date, six Veterans have exited homelessness, with \$2,935 expended. The Veterans Assistance Center saw 126 Veteran visits for essentials and food; served148 meals and fielded 946 calls/emails. Volunteers provided 448 hours of service for a value of \$11,073. The Free Clinic Dental Program served three Veterans and billed \$703. WDVA VSO second quarter report reflects 430 claims with 83% approved and \$217,101 in VA payments to Veterans. VAF balance at the end of June was \$948,951.

SWACH Navigator Contractor Update Contract has been executed for 12-months at \$30,000, as approved.

Veterans Assistance Center (VAC) Update

- The CCVAC received \$700,000 for the TERA/TRAP Program and have \$17,600 remaining. Back rent and future rent has been paid for Veterans.
- Stand Down will be October 1st and 2nd from 9am to 1 pm. This event will be from a drive-thru/walk-thru event like last year, at River City Church. \$22,000 spent so far.
- CCVAC has hired an outreach specialist and is distributing school supplies from the Reserve Center.
- Next online auction will be September 1-14; the link will be sent out.

NW Battle Buddies provides service animals for Veterans. It was asked whether the Fund can make donations to help cover program costs. Bruce Maas mentioned that the Traveling Wall will be coming to Mt. Solo Cemetery in Longview, on September 24-26, 2021.

Sam is co-chair of the ACHS Veterans Committee. The Committee is prioritizing legislative support for VSOs under RCW 43.60. This will affect rural counties with populations less than 100,000.
