III. Ch 3: Operations & Existing Conditions – Doug Drennen, JRMA (*00:01:43)

Background

- Have been doing regional system study for the past two years
- Have done full assessments of both operational and physical conditions of the facilities
- Have updated data to consider latest information
- 20-year agreement with Columbia Resource Company (CRC) signed in 1990
 - Purpose is to provide service to transport and dispose of waste as well as own and operate transfer stations
- New contract signed in 2006, with 10-year term, and two extensions
 - o Included new East County Transfer station, which opened in 2009
 - o Install and upgrade equipment at West Van
 - o First extension enacted from 2016-2021
 - Make certain improvements to CTR, including entrance
 - County notified CRC of intent to extend contract beyond 2026
 - Began negotiations and developed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
 - □ Extended for another year at City of Vancouver's (CoV) request to provide more time to facilitate long-term contract
 - Second 5-year extension to 12/31/2027
 - County has option to purchase each transfer station for \$1.00, with notification to CRC by 01/2028
 - City of Washougal has option to purchase Washougal Transfer station, with payment of remaining amortized value
 - □ Full depreciation expected in 2029
- County currently in negotiations for new operating contract
 - o There has not been an RFP since 1990

¿ Request

Overview

- Since the first transfer stations opened in 1992, county's population has increased by 105%
 - From 1993-2021 county's disposal of waste has increased from 173k to +400k with no significant improvements to transfer stations
 - 2020 census described Clark County as the fastest growing county in the state
 - □ Most growth is expected in North County
- West Vancouver Materials Recovery Center
 - o Serves greater Vancouver area
 - o 21+ acres in Port of Vancouver
 - Back area is limited in use
 - Waste taken to Finley Buttes
 - o Yard debris is taken to Dirt Huggers
 - o Receives ~30% of all waste generated in county
 - o Averages 400-425 tons of waste daily
 - o Open to self-haul 6 days a week
 - o HHW on weekends
 - Not enough space to continue to handle public traffic
 - o Currently looking to relocate MRF
 - Over a 6-year period
 - Waste received increased 14%
 - Number of trips has increased by 53%
 - Commercial trips averages about 100 trips per day
 - Cash haul trips increased 65%
 - Serves as primary facility to process comingled recyclable materials in the county
 - o CRC expanded processing line with additional materials in 2008
 - Equipment is outdated
 - Summary of existing conditions
 - In fair condition with some damage to some internal columns
 - Other support structures ate in fair to good condition, but need updating
 - More space is needed to handle organics in the future
 - Traffic frequently backs up
 - More stalls ate needed for unloading
 - □ New commercial scale should help
 - If MRF is relocated, 45k square feet of existing structure can be repurposed
 - Currently a new master plan is being prepared
 - □ Will identify improvements and capital needed
- Washougal Transfer station
 - ~4 acres in Port of Washougal
 - Waste taken to Wasco landfill
 - Serves Camas, Washougal, and east Vancouver
 - Serves public three days per week
 - Receives ~ 125-135 tons per day
 - Increased from 110 in 2016
 - Waste is transported to Wasco County
 - Over a 6-year period,
 - Waste received has increased from 31k to 38k (23%)
 - Trips have increased 77%
 - o Commercial averages 25-30 trips per day

Suggestion

- o Cash/haul average 190 trips per day
- Summary of current conditions
 - Fair to good
 - Facility not large enough to store materials at times

- Not enough stalls available for vehicles to unload
- Will need to expand to handle more traffic and current waste, and manage future growth
 - ☐ Phase 2 RSS will prepare a plan for expansion
- o Receives 5-10% of all waste generated in county
- o There is a proposal to extend operating hours at both Washougal and West Van
- Central Transfer Station
 - o Slightly over 5 acres in Brush Prairie
 - Serves largest area of county
 - Open to public 7 days a week
 - Only facility open on Sundays
 - o Receives between 800-1,100 tons of waste per day (66% of county's waste)
 - o Can receive more than 800 trips per day
 - Over a 6-year period
 - Waste has increased from 214k to 251k (17%)
 - Number of trips has increased 24%
 - o Traffic has been an issue for years
 - New turn lane has improved traffic somewhat, but still have concerns of cross traffic
 - More work to be done
 - Right-turn out, only
 - Not enough stalls
 - o Current conditions
 - No major improvements since 1992
 - Well maintained and in good condition
 - Facility needs to be expanded to operate more efficiently, and manage growth
- All facilities
 - o Population has doubled since West Van and CTR opened in 1992
 - Waste disposal has increased 167%
 - Main structures seem to be in good conditions
 - No major improvements or expansions since built
 - o Each facility is receiving more waste than was intended
 - Will be completing a CIP for these facilities, as part of the Regional Systems Study

Discussions

- What kind of expansion can be expected for CTR?
 - o 3-4 options have been developed, including
 - Facility could be expanded with a zoning change
 - New location
 - o When will the decision be made?
 - Negotiations include a capital improvement plan (CIP)
 - Hope to be able to close negotiations and share the information
- If more curbside service is provided, would that reduce the pressure on the facilities?
 - o Each service is contracted separately
 - o Limiting factor in collection services is the transfer element
 - All require consolidation before moving to another destination
- Can Dirt Huggers continue to keep up with our supply?
 - o They have the space, just need additional financing to build proper structures
- CIP has a preliminary schedule
 - o Somethings can be moved around a bit
 - o There will be an opportunity to prioritize

Suggestion

- CRC has been able to adapt and operate the facilities, though not without stress
- Is there an aspect of the long-term plan that is targeting market opportunities for a higher return?
 - Always trying to do better, but cannot talk about it much at this point (due to negotiations)

Solid Waste Advisory Commission – 10/06/2022

- Recycling markets were significantly disrupted in 2016, with the onset of China Sword
 - o Paper and fiber markets in the US are getting better
 - Market prices fluctuate on a regular basis
- Are there any other facilities you might be able to recommend as a model transfer station facility?
 - o City of Tacoma has rebuilt their facility, and has neighborhoods nearby
 - o Seattle south is in an industrial area, but has residential areas nearby
 - o Seattle North is right in a high-end residential area
 - South Seattle transfer stations, to see potential possibilities
- Are we looking at building capacity for the possibility of disaster damaging, or closing one of the facilities?
 - Resiliency and transparency are central to the negotiations
