PIT Count – What is it?

- Single Night Snapshot normally last Thursday in January
- Required by HUD & WA Dept. of Commerce
- Trends
- New tools and increased effectiveness in counting each year
- Enables better planning and funding determinations

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Best available data

Data Sources

- Sheltered Count
 - Homeless Management Information System
- Unsheltered Count
 - Non HMIS Service Locations
 - School District Homeless Liaisons
 - Street Count
 - Project Homeless Connect Event



2023 Process Highlights

- Year-round professional outreach teams planned and performed street count.
- Conducted surveys using mobile app "Counting Us" for 4th year.

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
• Saw return to pre-pandemic attendance at the Project Homeless Connect event.





2023 CLARK COUNTY, WA POINT IN TIME COUNT RESULTS with 2022 comparisons







Increase in people within Sheltered count

- 428 people counted in ES in 2023. 389 in 2022.
- +10% in sheltered clients largely due to increased number of year-round ES bed capacity.
- Bertha's Place opened to full capacity and new safe living community (Hope Village)
- 9% more people in Transitional Housing



More family shelter beds.

In comparison to 2022 count:

- 13 more family households were staying in family emergency shelters in 2023
- 2023 is the first year we've counted more families in shelters than in unsheltered situations.



2023 continued stemmed growth in unsheltered senior numbers

- Since 2017, we had been seeing a consistent annual growth in the number of seniors age 62+ experiencing unsheltered homelessness.
- 3 in 2017 and had increased to 37 by 2020.
- Early 2022 Bertha's Place opened prioritizing seniors age 55 and up.

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• In the 2023 PIT count the unsheltered seniors age 62+ count was 40.

Unsheltered increase in singles or couples without children and chronic homeless populations.

- 15% increase in number of unsheltered single individuals or couples without children. 527 in 2023 compared to 457 in 2022.
- Chronically homeless unsheltered individuals increased 78% from 2022.



Nearly 2 out of 3 people experiencing homelessness do not sleep outside.

- 38% of people surveyed indicate they sleep outside.
- 33% of people stayed in Emergency Shelter.
- 15% of people in Transitional Housing.
- 14% of people surveyed slept in their vehicle.

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Affordable housing crisis in Clark County:

- Spring 2022 apartment market report shows a 2.7% vacancy rate for one-bedroom apartments. 2.9% for two-bedroom. Source: University of Washington Center for Real Estate Research

- Housing wage needed to afford the average one-bedroom apartment in Clark County in 2023 is now \$30.96/hr. In 2022, it was \$25.60 source: National Low Income Housing Coalition Out of Reach 2023 report
