Quarterly Outcomes Report: July 1, 2022 - March 31, 2023

The Community Action Advisory Board advises Clark County Community Services and the Clark County Council regarding the Community Action Program (CAP) and Homeless Crisis Response System (HCRS) programs. Funds come from a combination of local, state and federal sources through the following programs: Human Services Fund (HSF), Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), Consolidated Homeless Grant (CHG), Housing & Essential Needs (HEN), Deed Recording Fees, and Marriage License Fees. Each agency reports on a variety of services and outcomes related to each program. Some of these activities are reported below along with an overview of the program spending.

Things to note about Community Action Program activities: The Clark College Financial Wellness Program is under new management. How they are measuring outcomes has changed. We are working to update their goals. Battle Ground Healthcare Dental Expansion is now operating after six months of establishing the program. The agency has seen overwhelming demand for services. Share Hunger Response bills costs to this grant before using other funding. It is common for them to spend out early in the year.

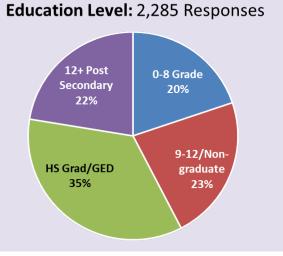
New Life Friends Church is a new agency operating housing services and took time to get the programs up and running.
