- I. Roll Call, Approval of Minutes June 1, 2023 (*00:00:05)
 - Unable to approve minutes due to lack of quorum
- II. Updates (*00:00:33)
 - Solid Waste Program Clark County Public Health
 - Sent out in advance
 - Conducted work session with Council on July 26
 - Council is interested in learning more about different ownership structures
 - o Likely to do another RFP for study on ownership
 - Doing outreach to all cities regarding SWMP to get feedback on interest
 - Regional System Study is complete
 - Can print copy if anyone is interested
 - Digital copy available on website as "Appendix L"
 - 21-23 LSWFA grant cycle complete
 - 23-25 LSWFA grant has begun
 - Agreement should be signed soon
 - Several RFPs in place
 - Leichner Landfill has been awarded to SCS Engineers
 - Triennial inspections of transfer stations will go before Council soon
 - CRC contract negotiations are ongoing
 - Extending collection contract, through amendment
 - o Should be finalized in next week or two
 - o Solid Waste Enforcement Clark County Public Health
 - Sent out in advance
 - 21-23 grant cycle has completed, and report has been submitted
 - 131 solid waste facilities inspected
 - o 92 permitted; 38 exempt
 - 4 new facilities
 - o 1 permitted; 3 conditionally exempt
 - Resolved 286 complaints
 - Received 279 complaints
 - 23-25 grant cycle has begun
 - Requested \$300,000 for biennium
 - Plan to add 0.25 FTE to assist SWE complaints
 - 2023 Q2 Overview
 - Inspected 13 facilities

Suggestion

o 12 permitted; 1 exempt

- Received 34 complaints
 - o Resolved 34
- WSDOT Salmon Creek Stockpile Pit seeking Solid Waste Handling Permit
 - o Staff & ECY provided comments on draft operational plan in February
 - o CCPH provided formal "next steps" to apply for permit
 - To date, no response has been received
- Keystone Contracting at Circle C Rock Pit seeking Solid Waste Exemption
 - Multi-agency inspection in August 2022 observed solid waste handling activities and multiple violations
 - April 2023 ECY re-inspection found illicit discharge
 - o May 2023 CCPH issued Notice of Violation
 - CCPH staff, management, and Health Officer communicating with CC Prosecuting Attorney for next steps

<u>City of Vancouver</u>

- Wrapped up annual Spring Coupon Program
 - Total cost \$79,588
 - Total cubic yards of yard debris: 6,244
 - Total tires 1,066
 - Total coupons redeemed 3,553
- Started planning for Fall Coupon Season (Oct-Dec)
 - Included in CRWWD newsletter; WC Fall Mailer; Neighborhood Fliers; Outreach etc.
 - Fall leaves boxes for neighborhoods too
- Anticipate an RFP for Yard debris receiving/processing services to go out soon (this month). Those vendor(s)/contracts support the above-mentioned coupon programs in addition to other yard debris generated from City solid waste programs and City operations.
- RecycleU trainings In-Person this fall
 - At Vancouver Community Library on Sept. 7
 - At Cascade Park Community Library on Oct. 3
- AmeriCorps member started pilot program of Litter Steward volunteers
 - Since October 2022, our AmeriCorps trained 46 new Litter Stewards
 - In total there are 113 trained and equipped Litter Stewards since the pilot program began in 2021
 - Conducted 13 City organized clean-up events since October 2022.
 - Litter Stewards picked up an estimated 2910 pounds, or nearly 1.5 tons, of litter/garbage from City property since October 2022
 - Will continue project next term
 - Conducted 13 events

o Waste Connections

- WC equipment rodeo in Spokane
 - Celebrates some of the best equipment operators
- Transfer stations running as normal
 - July garbage volumes were down ~3%
 - July recycling volumes down 7-8%, curbside
 - Also seeing less construction & demolition materials
- Commodities are moving, but at lower prices
- West Rock mill in Tacoma is closing
- Good home growth
- About halfway through automation rollout
 - ∼70k homes in urban growth area
 - Still waiting on one truck to be delivered
- Reuben do you have any preliminary info on the source of the container fire?

- Not able to get to root cause, but more than likely a battery
- No damage to container.

III. Presentation: Hazardous Waste Collection Projects (*00:30:19)

- Summary of Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) events in Yacolt, Ridgefield, and La Center
 - Coordinated events for communities that do not have easy access to HHW facilities
 - Collected almost 27.8 tons of HHW
 - Total of 521 participants
 - Average of 133lbs per participant
 - Paint was the largest contributor at all three events
 - Postcards sent out in advance, in a 5-mail radius of collection site
 - Good outreach opportunity
 - Handed out RecycleRight cards with link to recent Solid Waste survey
- Q&A
 - Joe how much did the postage for the postcards cost?
 - ~\$80 per event
 - Jason was there a social media pulse?
 - Yes, but some people don't engage that way
 - Laura is there capacity to include more participants?
 - Would be difficult to find locations that would accommodate more
 - School parking lots are the largest available, and traffic was still backed up
 - Would need to get bigger crews for hazardous waste handling company
 - Reuben what were the hours?
 - 9am 1pm at each site
 - Melissa Emergency preparedness program does several large-scale community events, and may be able to give some advice for larger events
 - Reuben how do these events compare to daily intake of HHW materials at the transfer stations
 - Have not compared data yet
 - (Jess replied in 8/08/23 email) I took the most recent annual total of HHW collected from the three facilities, and it averaged 20 tons a weekend. The events brought in a total of 30 tons. So the events collected approximately 1.5 weekends worth of HHW that the fixed facilities bring in.
- o Introduction to Battery Take-Back program
 - Battery waste is increasing dramatically
 - Limited drop-off options
 - This year a state-wide law has passed, but will not start until July 2027
 - County will be conducting this program to fill the gap in the meantime
 - Setting up volunteer retail/community sites with capability to accept batteries
 - Call2Recycle provides boxes for battery drop-off locations
 - Kits being purchased by Columbia Resource Company
 - Goal is to make battery recycling more accessible, and prevent improper disposal
 - Some sites have already signed up
 - Targeting sites that already handle hazardous waste
 - Will do launch to public after a number of sites have signed up
- Q&A
 - Reuben what will be the metric for success?
 - Once boxes are full, they will be mailed back to Call2Recycle, who will then send data back to us
 - Tina is there a county code that restricts rechargeable batteries in the garbage?
 - Not at this time, but CRC has their own guidance
 - Melissa there is no plan to add this to the County Code, as it would be almost impossible enforce

- This may become a benefit to drop off locations, to bring in more customers
 - May consider a map on county website with participating businesses
- Joe How does reorder process work?
 - Initially given two boxes, so there is always an empty, then an empty box is mailed to them anytime a full box is sent out.

 - There will be an additional opportunity to comment on the SWMP draft during the public comment period
 - SWAC will still be able to use Public Comment button on webpage
- Review Timeline and Next Steps
 - Graphic provided, and available on SWMP webpage
 - Aligns with new LSWFA grant timeline
 - Grant runs July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2025
 - Anticipate having SEPA completed Sept. 30
 - Should have to SWAC for review by November meeting
 - Have completed UTC cost questionnaire
 - Meeting with each city in August for outreach and Interlocal Agreements
 - Anticipate bringing Staff Report to council in Q2, seeking approval for ILAs
- o Paper copies available for SWAC members attending in person
 - Contact Amber McKnight to arrange alternative pickup time

- o County has awarded a contract to Maul Foster for formatting design work for the SWMP
 - Reworking current draft for more professional appearance
 - Will not be working on content; only format
