Marshall Leadership Awards Presentation, Temple Lentz and Eduardo Torres

The Marshall Leadership award has been presented in partnership with the City of Vancouver since I 989 in honor of General George C. Marshall. The award is presented to a high school senior and a young adult in the community that follows General Marshall's leadership principles. All applicants are nominated by community members prior to applying for the award.

The high school winner is Naomi Axelrod. She has raised money for hurricane wildlife relief and has organized blood draws at her school. She plans to attend Cornell and use her education to work for the Department of Defense.

The young adult winner is Eduardo Torres. He is a youth mentor that believes there is strength in diversity. He shared that the award was an honor and thanked the board for their service. His advocacy efforts aim to assist the veteran community and Clark County at large.

Questions and Comments:

Q: Has Eduardo Torres served I the military?

A: No, but he worked 8 years at a federal refugee shelter supporting troubled youth.

Q: What is the criteria for selecting awardees?

A: The Trust does not promote certain people be nominated, but outreach throughout the community is done. Q: Where does the Historic Trust money come from?

A: Funding comes from donors, sponsorships, and the City of Vancouver.

March 2025 Contractor & Fund Reports

- CCVAC: 37 Veterans served in March, services totaling \$34,195.55. 33 male veterans, 4 female veterans, 0 widow, 0 other veterans. 9 denials, 0 subject to appeal. 622 visits to the center for essentials and food, 993 sack breakfasts/lunches provided and 61 food boxes provided. 4,544 total pounds of food. 544 volunteer hours, totaling \$21,912.32 in value.
- Free Clinic: 3 Veterans served in March. Services totaled \$1,770 in value; billed \$703.41.
- WDVA: 735 claims in the first quarter (January-March) of 2025, with 93% of claims being successful. \$1,440,802 in VA payments were made.
- VAF Fund: March revenue: \$56,710.36; expenditures: \$79,551.75; fund balance: \$439,197.11, about a \$22,841.39 decrease in the fund from last month.

Questions and Comments

Q: Is CCVAC paying rent for active-duty military? A claim shows service for a beneficiary as 2020-present.

A: We can assume that this is a claim for someone that is in active duty. CCVAC will look into this and provide further updates.

 and is asking for building referrals from the board.
- The Boots, Chaps, and Cowboy Hats Gala will be on June 21st from 4-9 p.m. at the Ilani Casino. This is the largest fundraiser of the year, and each Legion and veteran organization is encouraged to buy a table.
- The Stand Down is on September 26th at the Armed Forces Reserve Center. Volunteer assistance or financial support is appreciated.

A: Ruth Lakel is the point of contact for the event.

Q: How much are gala tickets?

A: \$175 per person or \$1,400 for a table.

Purpose

The Clark County Community Needs Assessment (CNA) is a strategic initiative aimed at systematically identifying the most pressing needs of low-income populations within the county.

- Community Action Agency requirement
- Completed every 3 years
- The purpose of the CNA is to:
 - Collect and analyze data about the needs of people in our community that have low-incomes
 - Inform future funding decisions
 - Inform policy and program decisions
 - Foster a collaborative approach among policymakers, service providers, community organizations, and residents



Methodology

Survey of Needs

- Distributed from February 2, 2023 through April 14, 2023
- Survey was available in hard copy and online in 5 languages
- Distributed through news releases, social media, and over 100 partner organizations
- Received 893 total responses

Community Forums

- 4 forums held in January 2024
 - 3 in-person in various locations, 1 virtual
- 61 attendees




Demographics – Survey Respondents

What is your age?




What is your current housing situation?




Does your family earn more or less income than the Federal Poverty Level?











Education Needs








Education Barriers







Employment Needs






Employment Barriers




Housing Needs









Housing Barriers









Income and Asset Building Needs









Income and Asset Building Barriers








Physical Health Needs






Physical Health Barriers


Behavioral Health Needs


Behavioral Health Barriers




Support Services Needs





Support Services Barriers





Takeaways

- Poverty in Clark County is influenced by various factors beyond just income.
 - Education, employment opportunities, housing, access to healthcare, access to support services
 - Cost of living and stagnant wages
 - Systemic issues like racism and discrimination
- Key recommendations
 - Financial assistance for education and training programs, improved outreach and support mechanisms, and policies that promote economic stability and opportunity
 - Policy interventions such as rent control and increased support for individuals experiencing houselessness
 - Expand access to healthcare, including mental health services
 - Comprehensive and coordinated efforts that address the root causes of poverty, not just the symptoms
