

#### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

 Action Parks and Nature Fee update-Free Access Days\*\* – Jennifer Coker/Ross Hoover

At the August meeting on 8/12/2025, Parks Advisory Board recommended fee increases to be implemented for 2026. Staff presented these recommendations at the September 17, 2025 Council meeting Work Session. Along with these recommendations, free days will be offered. Staff will review options for free days in 2026f or PAB's advice and recommendation this free day schedule.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

 Informational: Inform PAB of recommendations for vacancies – Ross Hoover

County staff advertised to fill 4 positions on the 7-member PAB board on 7/23/2025 and the application deadline was 9/01/2025. Staff received 4 total applications or letters of interest, including 2 from current members whose terms are set to expire on 12/31/2025. Ross Hoover, along with Jessica Barksdale and John Rafanelli, interviewed 2 of the applicants on 9/23/2025. The recommendations to fill the 4 vacant positions are: James Kautz, Janis VanWyhe, Russell Malburg, and Jordan Hamann. The terms of

their appointment will begin on 1/01/2026 and end in staggering years.

2. Informational: Climate project – Jenna Kay and Amy Koski
With the passage of House Bill 1181 during the 2023 legislative session,
Clark County is now required to add a Climate Change Element to its
Comprehensive Plan. The new element needs to address both greenhouse
gas emissions reduction and resilience. Project staff will provide a project

#### Background

- Fee increases & Access days proposed at the September 17, 2025 work session were supported by council
- Key inclusion of annual passes at libraries
- Council feedback on Free Access Days:
  - No overlap with Washington State Parks
  - Provide 12 different days to maximize access
  - Provide days throughout the months and seasons
  - Provide a mix of weekend and week days



# Proposed New Program - Free Access Days

Ensuring Equitable Access



# **Free Access Days**

**A New Program** modeled after WA State Parks

- 12 free access days per year
- Distributed through all seasons
- Council direction to not overlap any of these listed days.

#### **HB 1181**

- Climate change and resiliency goal in Growth Management Act (GMA)
- Climate Element in Comprehensive Plan
  - Resilience
  - Greenhouse gas reduction
- Themes: Environmental Justice, Best Available Science, Commerce Guidance
- Due date: December 2025

- Identify, protect, enhance natural areas
- Identify, protect, enhance community resiliency
- Address natural hazards
- Prioritize actions that benefit overburdened communities




Figure 1. Washington's total GHG emissions 1990-2019 in MMT CO<sub>2</sub>e

# Resilience

Climate resilience means the ongoing process of anticipating, preparing for, and adapting to changes in climate and minimizing negative impacts to our natural systems, infrastructure, and communities (RCW 70A.65.010).

# **Exploring Climate Impacts**

- Climate impacts serve as the basis for defining the "problem we're trying to address" with comprehensive plan goals and policies for the resilience sub-element
- Summary of climate impacts. Examples:
  - Destruction or damage to historical buildings and sites; parks; outdoor recreation areas
  - Physical stress on plants, animals, and soils
  - Water pollution in streams, lakes, rivers
  - Air pollution
  - Physical and mental health impacts on individuals from exposure to heatwaves, smoky air, mold/mildew, landslides/fires/floods, algal blooms, and more



# **Greenhouse Gas Reduction**

Greenhouse gas emissions reduction means actions taken to reduce or eliminate the emissions of greenhouse gases (present and future) in order to reduce the rate and extent of climate damage.

(WA Dept. of Commerce Climate Element Guidance)



# **Unincorporated Clark County Local Emissions - 2022**

Local 2022 Greenhouse Gas Emissions totaled

1,468,371 MT CO<sub>2</sub>e\*

\*MT  $CO_2e$  is a metric ton of  $CO_2$  equivalent, a way to add up all greenhouse gasses 1 MT  $CO_2e$  is roughly equivalent to 113 gallons of gasoline burned or the carbon sequestered by 1.2 acres of forest

# **Environmental Justice**

# **Vulnerable populations**

Population groups that are more likely to be at higher risk for poor health outcomes in response to environmental harms (RCW 36.70A.030)

# **Overburdened community**

A geographic area where vulnerable populations face combined, multiple environmental harms and health impacts (RCW 36.70A.030)



# **Equity and Environmental Justice (EJ) Lens**

The Equity and EJ Lens includes three overarching questions to aid analysis of policy concepts:

- Who is most impacted by this issue or decision? (positively or negatively)
- What does the data tell us? (consider qualitative and quantitative data)
- What are the ways in which a policy recommendation could be modified to enhance positive impacts or reduce negative impacts?

# **Example Draft Climate Element Goals**

- 14.7: Connect outdoor recreation to public health. Improve access to green spaces, parks, and recreational areas, which provide opportunities for physical activity, stress reduction, and social connection, contributing to overall health and wellbeing, while also mitigating urban heat island effects and enhancing resilience to extreme weather events. [RES]
- 14.9: Protect and plant more trees in rural and urban areas and equitably increase tree canopy cover through targeted planting and maintenance support. [GHG, RES]



# **Example Draft Climate Element Goals**

- 14.10: Increase, enhance, and protect County-owned plantings and greenspaces. [GHG, RES]
- 14.11: Promote regenerative and sustainable forestry practices community-wide. [GHG]
- 14.12: Improve public awareness of environmental topics including native plant varieties, benefits, and care; ecosystem functions; water quality and watershed functions; climate science; conservation; human relationships to nature, and ways to reduce an individual's personal carbon footprint. [GHG, RES]



# **Example Draft Climate Element Goals**

- 4.3: Identify, protect, preserve, and rewild: environmentally critical areas; riparian areas, wetlands, prairies, and forests; and urban and rural open space. [RES]
- 4.10: Manage the parks and open space of Clark County consistent with protecting water quality and critical areas and with enhancing the recovery of listed species. [RES]. (Note: this is an existing comprehensive plan policy.)
