
Why are parks important in Ridgefield?

How much will all of that cost?

For acquisition, development, and renovation of current and proposed parks (six year plan):

- Community Parks: \$14,285,000.00
- Neighborhood Parks: \$ 6,739,500.00
- Trails: \$ 1,555,000.00
- Special Use and
 Pocket Parks: \$ 8,108,700.00

Total:

\$30,688,200.00




Does growth pay for itself?

- Park Impact Fees are imposed on new development to meet the increased demand for parks that results from <u>new</u> growth (average about \$4,500 per home)
- 25% of all developments must be dedicated to parks and open space
- Maintenance costs and costs for existing parks rest on the City. Need to plan ahead for those ongoing expenses.


