BACKGROUND

Consistent with Strategic Initiative 2 to increase opportunities for healthy living, CCPH partners with the City of Portland to provide critical services to persons living with HIV/AIDS (PLWH/A) in Clark County. These services include providing case management and referring clients as needed to available resources.

The City of Portland receives Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) funding for this geographical region and passes through this funding to the local health jurisdiction to administer funds in the Portland-Vancouver metropolitan area. The services include case management, housing placement, and rental assistance.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

CCPH collaborates with a variety of service organizations to ensure clients have medical, food, and psychosocial resources to improve their health and health outcomes.

HEALTH EQUITY

The goal of the HOPWA program is to provide affordable housing and housing-related services to PLWH/A. The majority of PLWH/A are very low income. They often face difficulty in obtaining housing because Clark County has a shortage of affordable housing.

Reducing disparities in housing improves health outcomes. Research has shown that providing stable housing for PLWH/A improves health outcomes and saves in medical costs. The National AIDS Housing Coalition study, "Examining the Evidence: The Impact of Housing on HIV Prevention and Care," concluded that housing status is a key factor affecting access to treatment and reduction of risk behaviors. Housing interventions have the potential to improve the health of PLWH/A and reduce the number of new infections.

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ACTION REQUESTED

- Clark County Board of Commissioners' approval to apply for City of Portland grant.
- Clark County Board of Commissioners' approval authorizing Public Health Director to sign the grant application, the agreement, and any subsequent amendments.
