Public Access Cable Proposal

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Definition of Public Access

"Non-commercial television programming produced by organizations and/or individuals in the community without restriction or censorship that air on a designated public access channel."

Envisioned as the "electronic soap box"



PEG Channels

Comcast and CenturyLink franchises:

- Government Access (CVTV) -3 channels (2 standard, 1 HD)
- Educational Access (TV ETC) -4 channels (3 standard, 1 HD)
- Public Access 1 standard channel
- One additional HD channel



History of Public Access

- 1981- Public access authorized through first cable franchise agreement
- 1984-1996- Cable operator provided studio, equipment and training
- 1984- Federal law prohibits local governments from requiring cable operators to provide operating support for public access



History of Public Access

- 1997 Franchise renewal, cable operator ceased providing public access in June 1999
- 2001- City and County provide \$150,000 in start-up operational funds and \$250,000 in capital for public access. Organization to be self-supporting within 3 years
- 2010-County begins providing annual operational support of \$50,000 for FVTV

Vancouver

History of Public Access

 From 2004-2012, FVTV received \$1.2 million in PEG capital funds

 From 2010-2015, FVTV received \$250,000 in operational funds from the County



Status of Public Access

- Fort Vancouver Television (FVTV) ceased cable broadcast on 12/31/14
- Collection and storage of PEG equipment
- Community Access Network (CAN)
- Comcast request to return the channel



Status of Public Access

- July 2014- FVTV not re-designated as public access provider
- April 2015- RFP issued for new provider, two proposals received (VCAM & FVTV)
- July 2015 Telecommunications
 Commission recommends VCAM proposal



Status of Public Access

- September- October 2015- Workshop with both Councils on VCAM proposal
- November 2015- VCAM Business Plan provided to City & County



VCAM Proposal

- Independent, non-profit organization
- Locally focused, non-commercial media anchored by community access television
- A community media & cultural center based out of the Kiggins Theater
- Partnership with WSUV



VCAM Proposal

- \$50,000 per year in operating funds from the City, County and WSUV
- WSUV's contribution contingent on the City & County contribution



Current Situation

- City has declined to provide operational funds
- Change in VCAM leadership
- Verbal offer to continue without City and WSUV operating funds
- Possible use of CenturyLink PEG funds



Considerations for Public Access

- More communications options available then in 1981 (YouTube, Facebook, Flickr, Twitter, Vimeo, etc.)
- City and County have no legal or contractual obligation to provide public access



Public Access Provider

- Authorization to broadcast on Channel 11
- First right of refusal on FVTV PEG funded equipment
- Ability to apply for annual PEG grants
- Commission Recommendation \$250,000 in PEG capital funds for start-up



Commission Recommendations

- Strong advocates for public access
- Proposal unlikely to succeed without ongoing, annual operating funds
- \$250,000 capital contribution needs to be carefully monitored
- Concerned about organizational name



Next Steps

Public Access:

- Negotiate Professional Services Agreement
- City and County designate public access provider and approve PSA



Next Steps No Public Access:

- Assign remaining HD channel and return standard channel to Comcast
- Make surplus equipment available to other PEG providers
- \$250,000 will be available for PEG grants
