





What Is Included In Per-Animal Cost?

- Admitting to shelter
- Physical exam
- Vaccinations, de-wormer, flea treatment
- Medical stabilization
- Lost & found services
- Redemption services (including lost and found animal posting)
- Minimum 3-5 day stay for every stray animal
- Financial reconciliation

HSSW Absorbs These Costs - What Is Not Included In Per-Animal Cost


- Length of stay beyond 3-5 days
- Re-homing/adoption services
- Spay/neuter surgery
- Medical care beyond immediate stabilization
- Microchip implantation
- Facility costs
- Large scale hoarding/contagious disease management
- Behavioral enrichment and training
- Consulting and counseling to keep animals in homes
- Euthanasia services and grief support
- Disaster response (training, supplies, staffing)
- Community education and resources

FACTS

- 60-70,000 feral and community cats in Clark County
- 2,810 cats entered HSSW in 2016. Less than 3% redeemed by owners
- 80%+ of cats euthanized at HSSW are feral/ community cats





WHY DOES CLARK COUNTY NEED A COMMUNITY/FERAL CAT PROGRAM?

- Great results in other public/private Trap/Neuter/Release (TNR) programs around the country Jacksonville FL | San Jose CA | Indianapolis IN
- Provides an alternative to euthanasia for feral and unsocial cats
- Removing these cats from their "established territory" doesn't work
- TNR works improves health, reduces population, eliminates nuisance behaviors
- Public concerns are addressed individually; alternative locations option

HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?

- Feral/Community cats assessed at intake About 200/year
- Accepted for TNR services only
- Invoice at a lower TNR rate \$150
- Altered, vaccinated, ear-tipped, then released back into original neighborhood
- Community education and assistance developing managing colonies

CODE CHANGES REQUIRED

- Current ordinance requires minimum 3-5 day stray holds. TNR can be interpreted as abandonment.
- Minor revisions to Clark County Code Section 8
- Community Cat Program definition Sponsored by animal control or designated agent Feral and community cats to be sterilized
- Rabies vaccination Ear-tipped
- Returned to original location
- City of Vancouver approved the program and is ready to initiate.
