## Keep your family safe:

- Don't allow anyone to smoke inside your home.
  If someone smokes outside, make sure that person:
  - Is at least 25 feet from the building.
  - Smokes away from things that burn, like barkdust and planters.
  - Safely disposes of cigarette butts in a non-combustible container (preferably metal) with water or sand.
- **→** Please let management know if you see:
  - People flicking cigarettes on the ground or putting them out in planters.
  - Cigarette butts spilling out of containers.
- Ask your landlord to adopt a no-smoking policy for the property.

- If loved ones use medical oxygen, make sure they don't ever smoke when using their oxygen.

## MAKE YOUR RENTAL PROPERTIES SAFER:

- Put a no-smoking rule in your lease. Eight out of ten Washington renters want a smokefree place to live. Enforce your no-smoking policy as you would any other rule (such as no pets or quiet hours).
  - Find sample lease language at www.clark.wa.gov/public-health.
- If you are not ready to prohibit smoking on the property:
  - Designate an outdoor area far from barkdust and planters and at least 25 feet from entrances, doors, stairways, windows and air intake vents.
  - Provide a non-combustible container for disposal of cigarette butts. It should contain water or sand to completely extinguish cigarettes.
  - Add a clause to the lease requiring proper disposal of cigarettes.
