MISSION STATEMENT

- Act as a liaison, where appropriate, to various levels of government by representing the interests of neighborhood associations.
- Act as a bridge, where appropriate, for communication between neighborhood associations and other organizations and businesses.
- Be accountable to local neighborhood associations for our activities.

- Want a community with wide-ranging services and uses.
- Want neighborhood associations to be a resource for information and referral.
- Want neighborhood associations to protect the community interests.
- Want to feel safe in their neighborhoods.
- Want a fair distribution of resources.
- Want to believe their interests are shared.
- Will be involved if it affects them personally.
- Want to get value from their neighborhood associations.
