Highlights from Neighborhood Association Councilors of Clark County (NACCC) Meeting that may affect your commute!

- WSDOT is in the process of planning how to improve the congestion at the intersection of SR500/4th Plain as it is the most congested intersection in Clark County. More than 20 potential solutions were analyzed and has been narrowed down to a handful of possible solutions. - If you work in Oregon, submit your vacation for September 2020! The I-5 bridge will be closed for up to two weeks as a cracked trunnion is replaced.
