Look for SafeWatch

As kids head back to school, make sure to tell them about the SafeWatch program. SafeWatch logos are placed on hundreds of utility, county and C-Tran vehicles to indicate the driver is a safe person to stop for help. If a person is in need of emergency assistance, flag down a vehicle with the SafeWatch logo by waving arms overhead. Drivers of SafeWatch vehicles often have radios or cell phones they can use to call for help, and some are trained in CPR and first aid. Be sure the whole family knows about this valuable community resource!



Truman Neighborhood Helping Hands Project

This is the 6th year for Truman's Helping Hands project where we raise money to purchase warm coats, clothing and footwear for children in need at Truman Elementary. We receive a list of children from Michelle Ames, the Community Resource Coordinator at Truman Elementary School, with recommendations from the teachers who see these children every day. This list only has the gender, age and sizes of the child along with articles of clothing needed.



Last year we were able to provide not only a small part of life's necessities for 10 children, but also a smile and a feeling that someone cares. One of those kids was homeless and living out of their family car, and 3 boys were from the same family.

We begin collecting donations at our October 24th meeting, and will be accepting donations through December 2nd. No amount is too small. Then we go shopping at Burlington on December 3rd.

What To Do With Burned Out Fluorescent Bulbs

CFLs contain small amounts of mercury so recycling them properly is important for safety!


There are multiple sites for proper disposal of fluorescent bulbs in Clark County.

Visit *LightRecycle. org* to search for a drop-off location close to you.



Clark Public Utilities has long provided free recycling and exchange of up to ten unwanted or burned out CFL bulbs, and exchanges them for two new LED bulbs at their local utility locations.





It's hard to believe, but winter will be here soon. This is a nifty & economical solution to standing in the freezing cold scraping the frost off your car windshield and windows:

All you need to do is combine: <u>1 part water</u> and <u>2 parts rubbing/isopropyl alcohol</u> in a spray bottle

Graffiti is an eyesore and a problem for all neighborhoods, but here in Truman graffiti is no match for Ken Rose and his mean machines. Ken goes out several times a year to power wash fences & sidewalks, when neighbors report problem areas. He puts two 50-gallon containers on his truck, fills them up with water (at his own expense), loads up the power washer & gas and off he goes. He does several areas at a time, as setting up the equipment in his truck is time consuming. Ken has been doing this for over 5 years and is a true asset to our community. He works under the good Samaritan rule, and that is what he is.

HOW DO I REPORT GRAFFITI OR OTHER VANDALISM?

- If you spot vandalism in progress, please report it to law enforcement immediately by calling 911.
- * If you see graffiti in our neighborhood please email us at: trumanneighborhood@gmail.com with the location.
- * If you have graffiti on your fence or home, you should file a report with the Clark County Sheriff's Office at www.clark.wa.gov/sheriff/file-crime-report. Also, take a photo of the graffiti prior to having the area cleaned or painted.
- * If you see graffiti or other vandalism on street signs, you can report it by calling the Public Works customer service line at (360) 397-2446 or by submitting an online maintenance request at www.clark.wa.gov/public-works/report-park-road.
