Property Tax Levy for Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Services

The Board of East County Fire and Rescue adopted Resolution No. 251-04162019 concerning a proposition to maintain and adequately fund District operations.

This proposition authorizes the District to restore its regular property tax levy to \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value to be assessed in 2019 and collected in 2020. The funds will maintain and improve fire protection, emergency medical services and facilities, replace apparatus and equipment, and provide for firefighter safety. The maximum allowable levy in 2019 shall serve as the base for subsequent levy limitations as provided by chapter 84.55 RCW.
