### Comment:

I would like to address the issue of what metrics will be required for local schools to administer the College Board SAT examinations. At my request, Camas High School Administration is seeking guidance from the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, but I know the issue will also come back down to the County Board of Health at some point. Currently schools are not in a position to open for instruction based on the State's metrics. However, there are SAT tests scheduled for 9/26; 10/3 and 11/7. The test for 8/29 was just cancelled at area schools. As far as I can tell no one in Clark County has been assessing what needs to happen in order to be able to administer these tests. If the answer is that these tests cannot be administered while schools are closed, then this needs to be relayed to parents and students so they can plan accordingly. If the answer is that we need to review the measures that schools can take to safely administer this examination, then it is important to the thousands of High School Seniors in our community to put those metrics together. My daughter took the Nursing NCLEX in July, in person and in an office, along with thousands of others in

the Northwest, without incident and with all prudent safety protocols. The WSBA has also hosted its July Bar Exam to large numbers. I know that with assistance from volunteers, and broad use of the School's open spaces, we can create a safe environment in which to test. We just need support and guidance from those who have the power to set the metrics and guide our volunteers. I am happy to take any calls regarding the subject, and to offer my time for any required research to help support my request. We have many highly capable Seniors in our community who are worried about their scholarship opportunities and getting into their first-choice schools when other parts of the Country are not restricted in their testing capabilities.
