In the Spotlight


From the beginning, I became interested in participating in the Clark County Sheriff's Office Paws on Patrol program. I have been an avid pet owner for more than 60 years! My two furry canines, Brittany Spaniels, are energetic, sociable, and great companions. Cinnamon is a 10-year-old American Brittany; Cinnamon became blind at 7 ½ years. The other is my French Brittany, LaKota, who is 19 months old and hyperactive. Every day, they sit beside me and become my shadow until I take them out for some exercise. They are natural bird hunters, but we only do that about three months out of the year.

During one of our walks near the Clark County Fairgrounds, the Clark County Sheriff's Office noticed Cinnamon and LaKota and introduced me to the Paws on Patrol program. They told me it was a crime awareness volunteer program for dog walkers to assist as extra eyes, ears, and paws for our routine walks. Naturally, I was highly interested and signed up right away.

When we received our Paws on Patrol pet tags, we changed our habits from being a typical dog walker to being aware of our surroundings and looking for suspicious activity. We also became ambassadors to other dog walkers, especially when they inquire about LaKota's & Cinnamon's "Paws on Patrol" badges. Because one dog is blind, running our patrols on trails like LaCenter, Fuller Park, Vancouver Lake, and Klineline is easier. Cinnamon can navigate these trails like no other, and folks find it hard to believe she is blind. LaKota usually takes the lead and pretends like we are on a hunt.

We meet many runners and walkers on the trails. When you make eye-to-eye contact with another, it entertains some conversation about dogs and what we do. It brings about a positive response from the community. We also patrol our local school campuses: Skyview, Alki & Chinook. On a few occasions, we have encountered homelessness and students skipping school. I let it be known that eyes are watching. It is an enriching and educational experience to be part of this great concept, "Paws on Patrol."

Paws on Patrol isn't exclusive to dogs. Meet Mr. Roarke, a 5-year-old Flame Point Siamese who enjoys short walks, Doritos, and Cheetos! Despite being a cat, he is fond of dogs, favors dog toys, and boasts exceptional hunting skills. True to his Siamese nature, Mr. Roarke is incredibly vocal. He proudly stands as the third feline member of Paws on Patrol.

Dogs have long been heralded as the ultimate protectors. Their loyalty, keen senses, and intimidating bark make them an obvious choice for guarding households. However, amidst the canine spotlight exists a silent but vigilant guardian—the cat. While often perceived as independent and aloof, cats possess qualities that make them remarkably effective watchdogs in their own right.

Heightened Sensory Perception: Despite their smaller size, cats have incredibly acute senses. Their exceptional hearing allows them to detect subtle sounds that might escape human notice, such as footsteps approaching the house or unfamiliar noises. Setting out to eliminate trash enhances community morale and turns your neighborhood into a nice place to call home. Ready to make a pawsitive impact like Krista and Johnny? Here are some tips to get you started!

Safety First: Before embarking on a litter pick-up adventure, ensure your pet's safety by using a sturdy leash, harness, or carrier, depending on the pet's species and size. Also, please make sure your pet is up-to-date on vaccinations and flea/tick prevention.

Choose Pet-Friendly Locations: Choose safe and suitable litter pick-up locations for pets. Avoid areas with heavy traffic, toxic substances, or aggressive wildlife. Parks, trails, and neighborhoods with sidewalks are ideal choices.

Equip Yourself and Your Pet: Equip yourself with gloves, trash bags, and a litter picker tool for collecting litter safely. For pets, consider bringing water, snacks, waste bags, and any necessary gear, such as a collapsible water bowl or a pet carrier.

Provide Positive Reinforcement: Encourage and reward your pet for participating in litter pick-up. Praise them with treats, verbal praise, and affectionate gestures to reinforce their cooperation and make the experience enjoyable.

Respect Wildlife and Habitats: Be mindful of wildlife habitats and nesting areas while collecting litter. Avoid disturbing wildlife and vegetation, and dispose of collected litter responsibly in designated waste bins.



Spring Pet Safety Tips

Spring is the perfect time to enjoy the outdoors with your furry companions. However, amidst the beauty of this season, potential hazards can pose risks to your pets. Here are some essential tips to ensure your pets stay safe and happy during the springtime:



Watch Out for Allergens: Like humans, pets can suffer seasonal allergies. Monitor for symptoms such as excessive scratching, licking, or sneezing. Pollen, grass, and various blooming plants can trigger pet allergic reactions. Consult your veterinarian if you suspect your pet is experiencing allergies.
