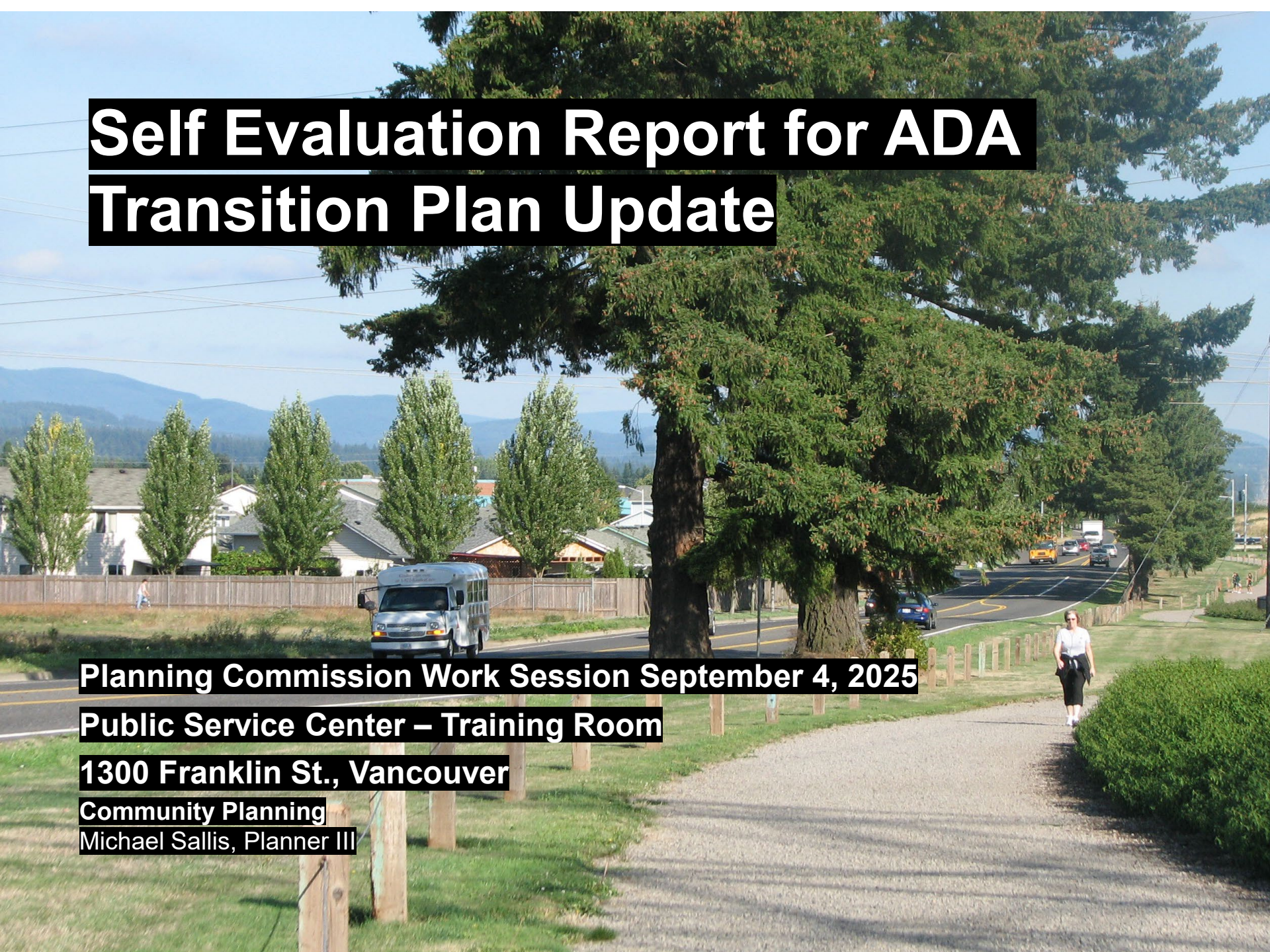

# ADA is Required by Law

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## The Americans with Disabilities Act:

- Was enacted in 1990
- Civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against people who have disabilities.
- Title II of ADA requires public services and public transportation accessible to those with disabilities.
- As part of the update and before the ADA Transition plan is completed, a self evaluation report/study is conducted to inventory and map out the county's transportation facilities for deficiencies.



## HB 1181 for ADA

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- As part of HB 1181, Clark County is required to develop and implement an ADA Transition Plan as part of the climate change initiative and the Comp Plan update.
- The ADA Transition Plan and Self Evaluation Report are intended to achieve the following:
  - Identify physical obstacles that limit the accessibility of facilities to individuals with disabilities;
  - Describe the methods to be used to make the facilities accessible;
  - Provide a schedule for making the access modifications; and
  - Identify the public officials responsible for implementation of the transition plan.



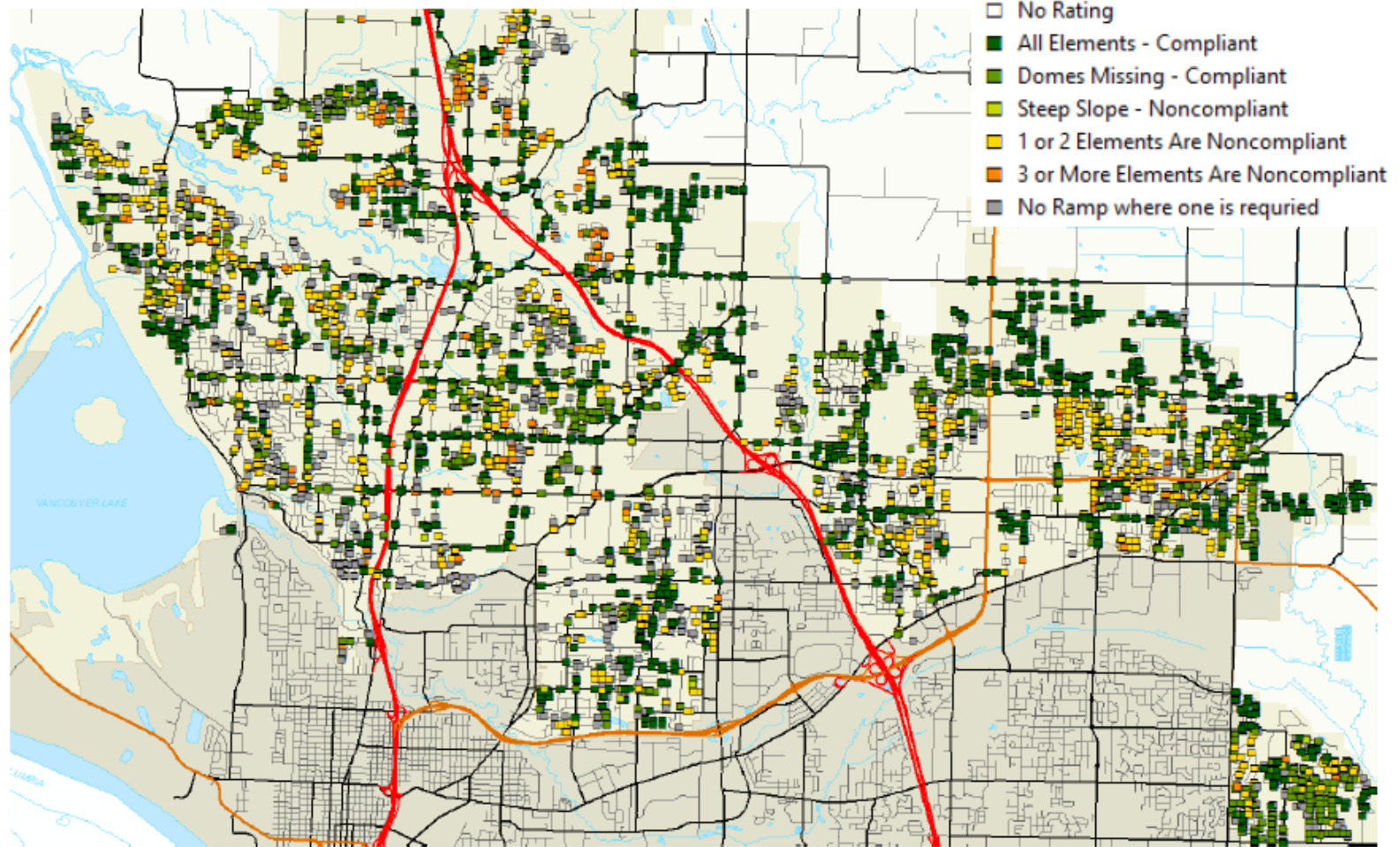
## Self Evaluation Report will Include

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- The county is required to perform a self-evaluation of its current facilities, relative to the accessibility requirements of the current ADA accessibility standards.
- Transportation facilities in this report are those that make up the pedestrian access route and pedestrian circulation path in the public right-of-way as defined in Clark County Code 40.350.
- The types of facilities being evaluated in this report will include curb ramps, sidewalks, and traffic control signals. The report will identify barriers to the accessibility of these facilities as defined by the ADA.



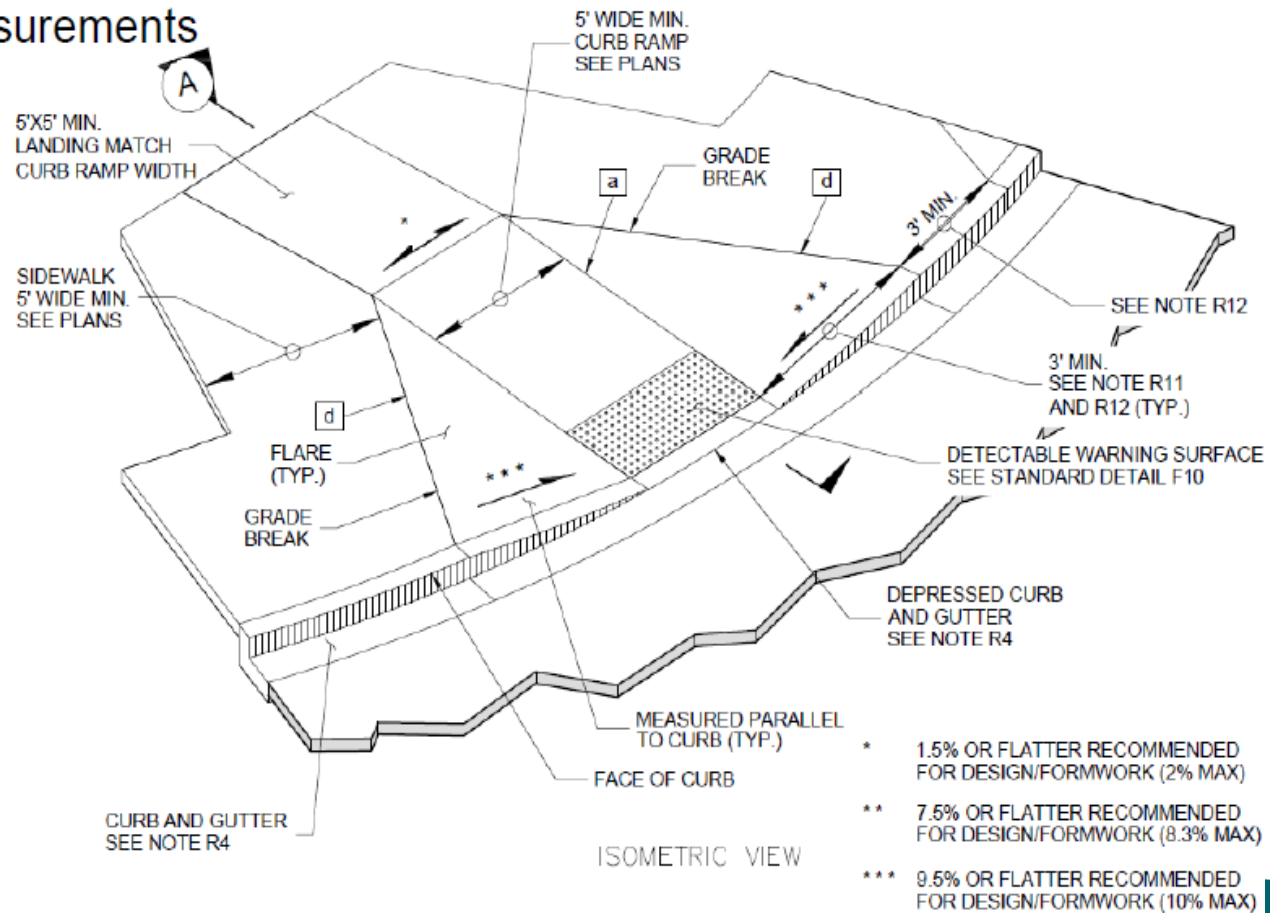
# Curb Ramp Visual Inspection Results 2020



# Curb Ramp Standards for ADA

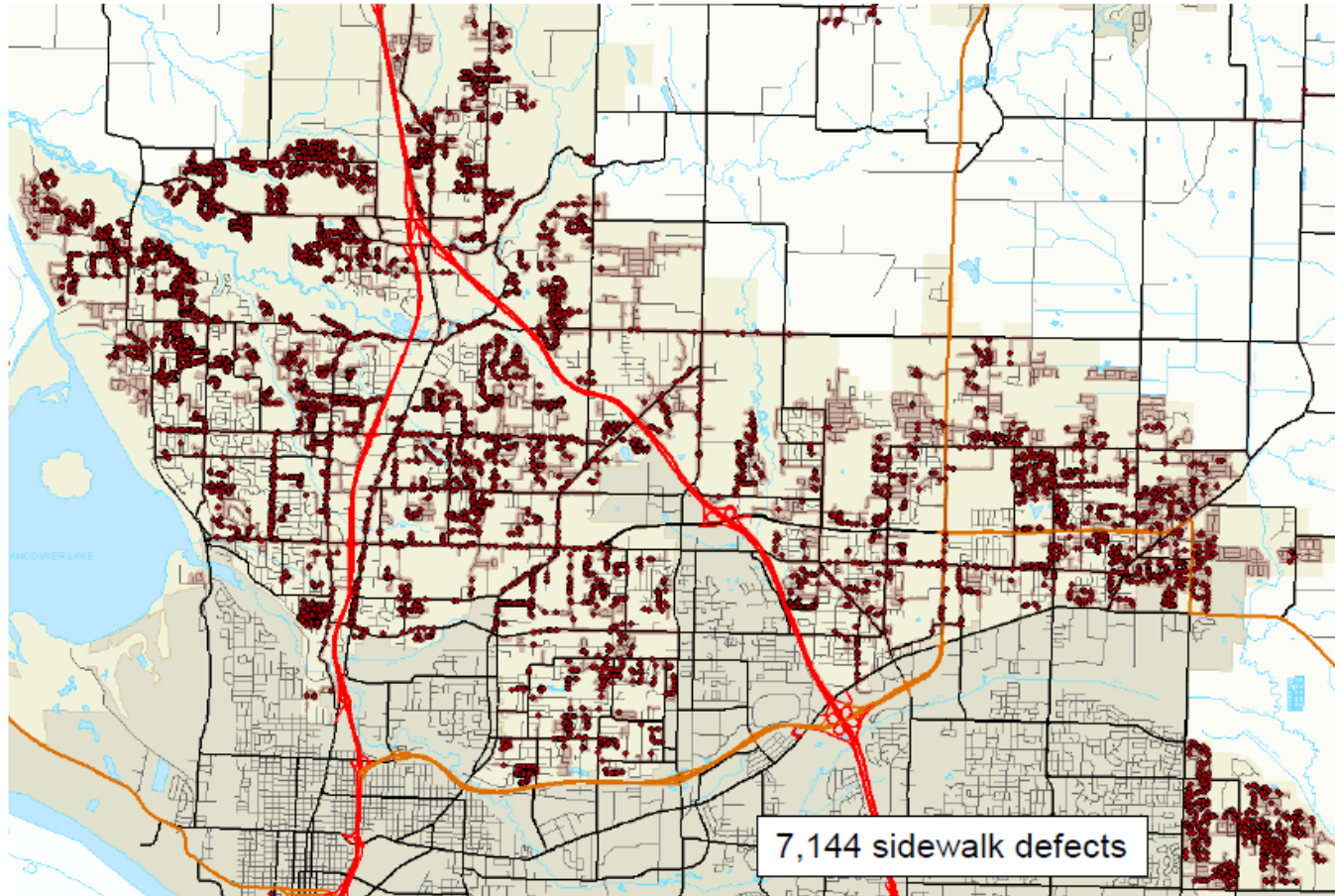
Curb ramps getting additional review

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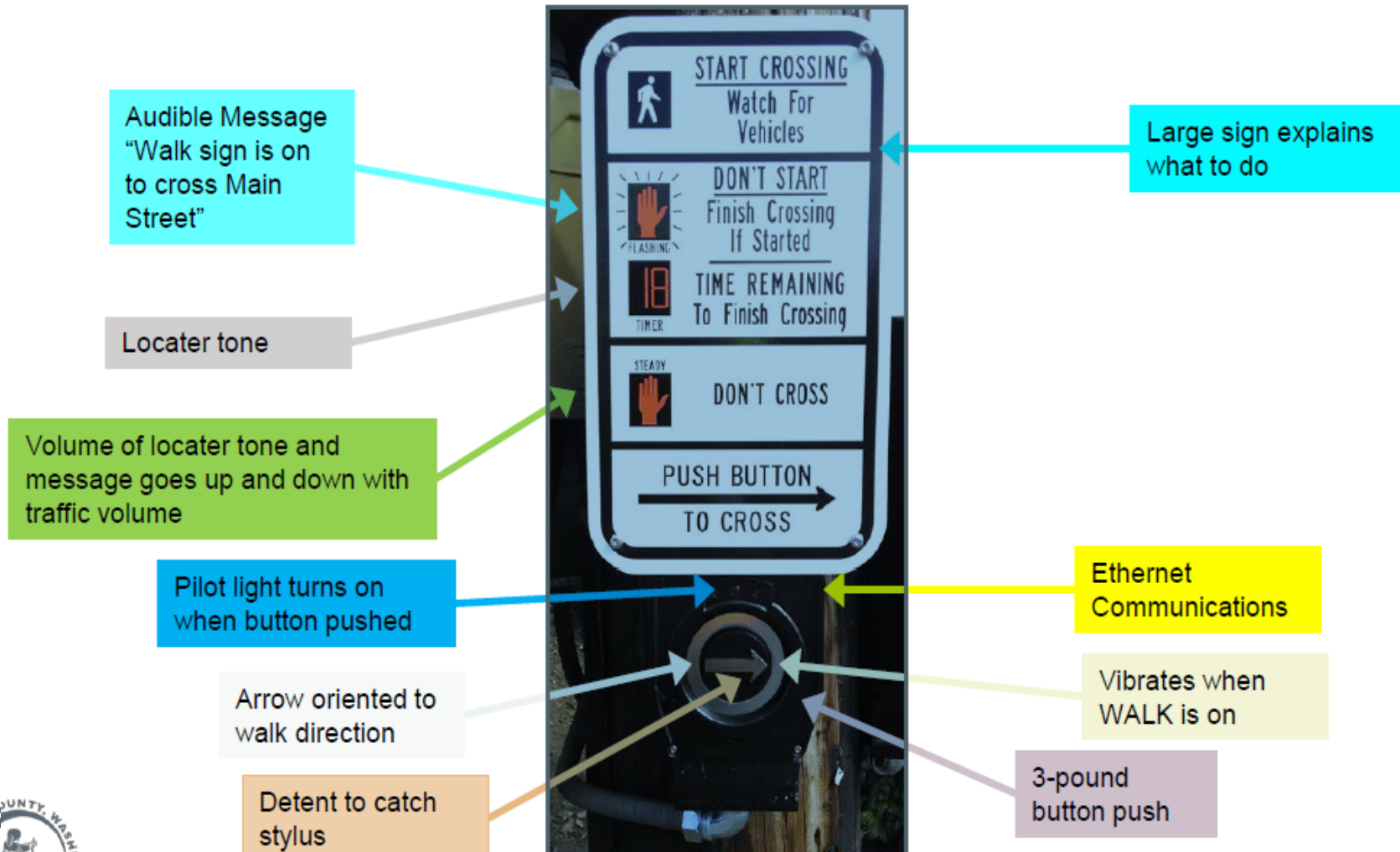
