SANTA'S POSSE Partnership of Giving




Can you believe the holiday rush is just around the corner? Santa's Posse is already preparing to assist 1,500 families this holiday season!




Please stop and say "hi" if you see us walking around Washougal. Joe is very friendly, well trained, obedient and loves everyone.

Clark County is home to over 110,000 dogs, of all shapes and sizes. Their poop adds up to more than 18 tons every day! Pet waste left on the ground mixing with stormwater can be washed into storm drains that lead directly to our streams and lakes. This waste carries harmful bacteria which can affect the health of aquatic wildlife, ourselves and our children.

Join thousands of Clark County neighbors and show your commitment to protecting the streams and lakes we love by pledging to:

- Scoop it, bag it and trash it. Everywhere.
- Keep dogs on leash in sensitive places like wetlands, riparian zones and wildlife habitat areas.
- Help spread this message to other dog owners!

Properly disposing of dog poop also helps you:

- Keep pets healthy.
- Make yards and parks safer and more pleasant places to play.
- Keep your and your family's shoes clean.
- Keep out of trouble with local ordinances.
- Support a healthy watershed.

Talking with Neighbors

We know that it can be difficult to talk to your neighbors about picking up after their pets. Canines for Clean Water can offer support for talking to your neighbors about picking up after their pets and connecting with other folks in your neighborhood who want to tackle the problem with you. Our goal is to make your community a safer place for your family, your pets, and the environment you live in.

Clark County Clean Water Division staff can discuss with you the best way to confront the problem in your area, whether it be putting signs in problem spots, instituting a weekly "Pick-up Day" for your neighborhood, or setting up a public bag dispenser on the corner. We'll give you tips to connect with others in your neighborhood who are motivated to reduce pet waste pollution.

Pet Tips for Winter

Halloween is a festive time filled with costumes, treats, and spooky decorations. However, it can also pose unique risks for pets. Here are some tips to ensure your furry friends stay safe while you enjoy the holiday.

Keep candy out of reach

Chocolate, candies with xylitol, and certain other sweets can be toxic to pets. Ensure that all treats are stored securely and monitor your pets closely if you're giving out candy.

Safe spaces

With doorbells ringing and strangers in costumes, Halloween can be overwhelming for pets. Create a quiet, comfortable space away from the commotion where they can retreat if they feel anxious. If your dog tends to act aggressively, limit their exposure to the front door during trick-or-treating hours.

Costume caution

If you choose to dress your pet in a costume, make sure it fits well and doesn't restrict their movement or vision. Avoid costumes with small parts that could be swallowed. Always supervise your pet while they're in costume to prevent any mishaps.

Identification

Ensure your pets are wearing collars with ID tags and are microchipped. If they do escape during the festivities, this will increase the chances of a quick reunion.

Decorations and hazards

Be mindful of decorations such as candles, electric lights, and small ornaments that pets might chew on or knock over.

Keep pets indoors

On Halloween night, it's best to keep pets indoors to prevent them from getting lost or frightened by the noise and excitement outside. This is especially important for cats to protect them from potential dangers like traffic, other animals, or human pranks. With trick-or-treaters constantly ringing the doorbell, it's easy for a cat to slip outside. Consider keeping windows and doors closed or using baby gates to block their access to exit points.
